REFRAME YOUR LANDSCAPE

LANDSCAPES surround us. Whether in Wisconsin, Brazil, or New Zealand, the places we inhabit is made up of different types of water like oceans, rivers, or lakes, and land like deserts, rainforests, and mountains. These **BIOMES** (areas of Earth with similar plants, animals, and climates)









ROCK OUT!

Enjoy the summer landscape and go for a walk outside. Collect a rock small enough to fit into the palm of your hand. Use the Wikki Stix and oil pastels to create your own landscape! Lay your rock down on top of the paper and push it around with your oil pastel to make squiggly lines. Let the rock guide your drawing. Next, fill in areas of your drawing with color. Then, cut, shape, and bend the Wikki Stix into plants or water before adding them to your landscape.







KEEP ON ROCKIN'

Next, try out an **ABSTRACT COMPOSITION** (one that does not represent an object exactly) by tracing your rock on your paper several different times with multiple colors. Fill in the rock shapes with color, lines, or patterns. See what happens when you blend the colors of oil pastel or layer them together. Add Wikki Stix in the negative spaces to finish your creation.








BRING YOUR ROCK TO LIFE
